(Analysis) Collecting and analyzing information about the problems.

(Response) Developing and implementing responses with the potential for eliminating or reducing the problems.

(Assessment) Evaluating the responses to determine the effectiveness.

Problem solving goes beyond traditional crime responses to proactively address a multitude of problems that adversely affect quality of life such as traffic issues, noise complaints, nuisance calls, etc.

#### **Scoring**

Only fully completed entries will be judged

A number system (1 through 10) will be used for the first six (6) questions (Section One)

A number system (1 through 10) will be used for the next three (3) questions (Section Two)

A number system, (1 through 5) will be used for the online Community Policing Questionnaire (Section 3)

Each entry will be scored 1 through 10 for the overall entry

The top three (3) entries in each category will be interviewed and/or visited by member(s) of the committee.
